Introduction

- Religion as an element of conflict. What to do?
- The traditional European answers:
 - banishing all religions except one from the public domain (confessional State)
 - banishing all religions from the public domain (secular State)
- For a number of reasons these answers have become ineffective. The need of a new answer
- Reconsidering the meaning of public domain?

Deconstructing the notion of “public”

- Secularization (*sécularisation*) of the public sphere
- Laicization (*laïcisation*) of the public institutions
- Pluralization of the public space

Secularization of the public sphere

- The starting point: wars of religions (XVI-XVII c.)
- Finding a way out: Grotius' "etsi Deus non daretur"
- The development of the idea: the Enlightenment

Laicization of the institutional domain

- The liberal State (XVIII c.) and the separation of Church and State
- Granting freedom of religion through the separation of Church and State
- The secular State (État laïc)

Pluralization of the public space

- **Causes:** migration, globalization, individualization
- **Effects:** coexistence of different religious (and non religious) beliefs and practices
- **Tensions:** places of worship, religious symbols, ritual slaughtering, etc.

What to do?

- **An open public sphere: beyond the horizon of secularism**
- **A fair institutional domain: ensuring the evenhanded treatment of religions and beliefs**
- **an inclusive public space: accepting pluralism on equal footing**
